

## Alberta Forklift License

Forklift License Alberta - Within North America, acquiring forklift certification or a forklift license involves classroom and hands-on training. Regulatory control over licensing, certification and training for powered industrial truck operators falls under the jurisdiction of state, provincial and federal groups. Operators can obtain a license either through training administered by the employer or by a third party. In any case, regulatory requirements should be met. Recertification is necessary every two to three years.

Lift trucks are powered industrial trucks which come together with various options, like for example stand-up and sit-down. There are various types and sizes of forklift suitable for different industrial uses. Operator training courses are usually individualized to address the certain types and uses for which the operator is training. Training on a sit-down, gas-powered lift truck in a warehouse surroundings will not be the same as training on a stand-up, propane-powered lift truck within a shipyard. The various forklifts and their applications makes it impossible to establish universal licensing requirements for all machines and businesses. Regulatory standards, therefore, have a tendency not to concentrate on detailed program requirements but rather on the results of individual training courses.

On the job training which is offered by the employer is the most common form of forklift training certification and licensing. The employer who provides this method of certification is required to provide practical training and classroom sessions on equipment at their place of work. Employers may choose to train workers on each and every type of forklift separately, or to train them on all equipment combined. The curriculum incorporates lift truck operation methods, forklift maintenance, safety procedures and company rules. Subject matters specific to the worksite, like hazardous conditions or materials, should be covered. Following classroom learning, operators are taught how to safely operate and utilize each and every type of forklift on the worksite.

Certification through a third-party vendor usually requires an on-site component along with hands-on practice.

It should be noted that employer-provided certifications do not transfer from one employer to the next. Receiving a lift truck license through employer-provided training permits the operator to run a forklift for that employer only.

The most important aspect of forklift license training is forklift safety. The exact safety training requirements differ from one kind of machine to another. Safety issues differ from employer to employer, and from industry to industry. Both employer-provided training and third-party providers may have to address additional requirements for safety training in applicable businesses, like for instance in marine and offshore operations.
